6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Habraghat Mahavidyalaya, Krishnai is a rural college that was established in 1979 with the mission of catering to the needs of higher education to the students predominantly belonging to Minority, SC, ST, & OBC communities which was the need of the time. As such we are committed to reach the following goals and objectives:

- > To provide necessary infrastructure and learning resources for imparting quality education leading to higher education.
- > To create job opportunity by introducing new subjects and professional courses.
- > To reach higher education to the unreached.
- > To develop a sense of unity, fraternity and equality in the students so that they become the ideal citizens for India tomorrow.
- > To develop self confidence and leadership qualities in the students as required to face the challenges of life through various competitions and programmes related to their practical life.
- > To strive for all round development of the students through extra- curricular activities.
- > To work for personality development of the students and for building of national character.

Vision

Our vision is to make the college an ideal centre of knowledge and learning through imparting quality and value oriented education as well as promoting academic excellence.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

The basic informations are communicated through the Prospectus published every new academic session while all other relevant informations are given by serving notices from time to time.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The curriculum is developed by the affiliating University. The college prepares a time-table for classes as per the contact hours required for effective implementation of the prescribed curriculum. Besides, some departmental seminars and workshops, field works etc are arranged by the concerned departments as a part of quality improvement strategies.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The college follows the syllabi and the academic calendar prepared by the university. However, the syllabi is distributed among the faculty members on the basis of total working days per semester. Besides, each faculty member makes a teaching plan depending on the volume of course and total class days allotted to him. Modern teaching — aids like white board, LCD Projectors, Laptops are used in the class room to make teaching-learning more interesting and effective.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

There is a system of internal and external evaluation. The internal evaluation is done through the sessional tests, field visit and project writing etc. While the external evaluation is done through the end-term external examinations conducted by the university.

6.3.4 Research and Development

With a view to promoting and encouraging research culture among the teachers there is a Research Committee. There is no research publications. One in-service teacher has completed Ph.D. and seven in-service teachers have been pursuing Ph.D. programme under different universities. The faculty members of the departments guide the students in project writing as a part of curriculum as prescribed by the university.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

There is a central library with a built-up area of 251.66 sqm. accommodating students' reading room, teachers' reading room, a computer lab with 21 nos. of computers. The library is enriched with 14322 text books and 795 reference books, 15 periodicals.
